 - Due in large part to the role non-governmental actors play

GOVERNANCE & THE CITY REGION

- An integrated approach that can accommodate a range of elements
- Encourage shared perspectives & aims among a diversity of stakeholders
- A way to consider metropolitan regions as functional entities



- Towards transparency





- Mechanisms for feedback essential throughout the process





- Breaking "silos"




- A departure from modernism

 - The power to get things done




- Decision making at the appropriate scale

- A marketable profile through projects









- Transparency, oversight & scrutiny
